Research Formation of Man

"After the earth with its teeming animal and vegetable life had been called into existence, man, the crowning work of the Creator, and the one for whom the beautiful earth had been fitted up, was brought upon the stage of action. To him was given dominion over all that his eye could behold; for 'God said, Let us make man in our image, after our likeness: and let them have dominion over...all the earth...So God created man in his own image...male and female created he them.' Here is clearly set forth the origin of the human race; and the divine record is so plainly stated that there is no occasion for erroneous conclusions. God created man in His own image. Here is no mystery. There is no ground for the supposition that man was evolved by slow degrees of development from the lower forms of animal or vegetable life. Such teaching lowers the great work of the Creator to the level of

Men are so intent upon excluding God from the sovereignty of the universe that they degrade man and defraud him of the dignity of his origin. He who set the starry worlds on high and tinted with delicate skill the flowers of the field, who filled the earth and the heavens with the wonders of His power, when He came to crown His glorious work, to place one in the midst to stand as ruler of the fair earth, did not fail to create a being worthy of the hand that gave him life. The genealogy of our race, as given by inspiration, traces back its origin, not to a line of developing germs, mollusks, and quadrupeds, but to the great Creator. Though formed from the dust, Adam was 'the son of God.'" (Patriarchs and Prophets 44-45)



Nature Kinds of Trees

Do you know how many different kinds of trees there are? There are about 20,000 different kinds. There are the mighty forest trees and the fragile ornamental trees. There are even more kinds of people, but each one is unique. The mighty forest trees towering above the others in strength can remind us of Adam, and the fragile ornamental trees make us think of lovely Eve. Together they reflected God's image. "He is strong in power" and "the beauty of the Lord" is majestic beyond our imagination (Isaiah 40:26; Psalm 27:4). In Adam and Eve and in their garden home were represented certain elements of heaven and of God's character—"strength and beauty." "Honor and majesty are before him: strength and beauty are in his sanctuary" (Psalm 96:6). Sometimes God combines "strength and beauty" together in one object. Sometimes He separates them.

The separation of "strength and beauty" is a little more striking when they are contrasted. Of this contrast we find examples in man and woman (the weaker sex), in the vine and the oak, in the violet sheltered in the cleft of the rock, and in the rainbow overhanging the waterfall.

But these qualities of God, so often separated and contrasted in nature, are also often combined. This is the case in trees. In the oak, "strength" is the first impression. Its sturdy trunk is the emblem of strength; and yet an oak, with its full canopy of glossy leaves, is not without "beauty." On the other hand, in the elm, "beauty" is the outstanding characteristic. With its light form compared with its height, with its symmetrical (evenly balanced) top and hanging branches, it

stands like a veiled bride in her beauty. Even so, there is an underlying impression of "strength" combined with the overall sense of the "beauty" of the elm.

But it is in human form that these qualities are capable of their highest and most perfect combination. A <u>strong</u> body in which the countenance radiates with "the beauty of holiness" is a fit representative of the "image of God."

Botanists are scientists who study plants and have divided trees into groups. Each tree is grouped with other plants that have certain characteristics in common with it. So, a single group of plants may contain the following plants, certain shrubs or vines, certain herbs and certain trees. One example of this is that the locust trees, broom plants, and clover are all in the same family. These plants all reproduce in the same way and have flowers that are similar. God had created many different groups of plants like the families of trees.


Now He wanted some creatures in His own image to be a part of His family. Trees faintly resemble man's physical being. Man has a trunk and limbs. God designed for man to see the resemblance between himself and the trees and to learn lessons from these kinds of the plant kingdom.

Trees can be divided into six main groups according to certain characteristics they have in common. These six groups are:

- (1) broadleaf trees;
- (2) needleleaf trees;
- (3) palm, pandanus, and lily trees;
- (4) cycad trees;
- (5) tree ferns; and
- (6) ginkgo trees.

Research Formation of Man from Dust

"And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul" (Genesis 2:7).

Let us look into God's workshop as He created the first man. He formed, or molded and fashioned him with His own hands. The word "form" is the same word used to describe the work of the potter. "But now, O Lord, thou art our Father; we are the clay, and thou our potter; and we all are the work of thy hand" (Isaiah 64:8).

The first man was formed from the dust of the ground. The very elements of the earth are what man is made of. When a man dies he decomposes (turns into

dust slowly) and returns to the earth. The major elements that make up the human body are oxygen, carbon, hydrogen, and nitrogen. There are other elements in smaller proportions. "Then shall the dust return to the earth as it was: and the spirit shall return unto God who gave it" (Ecclesiastes 12:7).

The spark of life given to Adam by God is called the "breath of life." "The Spirit of God hath made me, and the breath of the Almighty hath given me life" (Job 33:4). When the lifeless form of man was given this "breath" he became a "living soul."

Man is God's "<u>work</u>manship" (Ephesians 2:10). This gives us confidence "that he which hath begun a good <u>work</u> in... [us] will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ" (Philippians 1:6).

Nature Broadleaf Trees

Broadleaf trees are found everywhere in the world. They include ashes, elms, maples, oaks, walnuts, willows, mahogany, mangroves, and many others.

Besides having broad, flat leaves, broadleaf trees of temperate regions are deciduous. What does that mean? They loose their leaves in the autumn. Their leaves change colors from green to bright red, yellow, or orange, and then they fall to the ground. In the springtime new leaves grow. There are a few kinds of broadleaf trees in temperate regions that do not lose their leaves in the autumn. An example of this are some varieties of holly trees and live oaks. Some tropical broadleaf trees are deciduous, but most are evergreen. The Bible speaks about a man being like a tree in Psalm 1:3. "And he shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water, that bringeth forth his fruit in his season; his leaf also shall not wither; and whatsoever he doeth shall prosper." Adam was created to be like an evergreen.

Broadleaf trees are called hardwoods because many of these trees, like beeches, maples, and oaks, have tough,


*Superscription = Writing on the out side or on the top. See Matthew 22:20: Mark 15:26. hardwood. Hardwood trees make the best furniture. There are broadleaf trees, like basswoods and cottonwoods, with soft, lightweight wood. Man was created perfect, like the hardwood, to be tough and strong.

Broadleaf trees usually have a spreading growth pattern. Most kinds have trunks that divide into many spreading branches of similar size. This is very different from the more upward growth of needleleaf trees.

Broadleaf trees belong to a large group of plants called angiosperms. The characteristics of these plants have flowers which develop into fruit that completely surround the seeds. Man was created to bear the fruit of a righteous character, reflecting the Creator's image.



"Please, ma'am, I am here!"


The helpful lady fulfilled her promise. The boy was sent to school again, and the widow found a friend in need.

"And the Lord God took the man, and put him into the garden of Eden to dress it and to keep it.

"And the Lord God commanded the man, saying, Of every tree of the garden thou mayest freely eat:

"But of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, thou shalt not eat of it: for in the day that thou eatest thereof thou shalt surely die" (Genesis 2:8-17).

In the Garden of Eden God gave man his home, and heaven was reflected in it. There was purity and beauty. Nature was in harmony with the spiritual innocence of man.

The whole area of Eden was fair and fertile, but God planted in the midst of it a garden of special loveliness. The spot in which nature came most closely into contact with man was a place of surpassing beauty. There is a lesson in this for us. God did not place Adam out in the wide field of nature, roving at large over the earth. No, He put man in a selected spot, in a garden. The garden of Eden was a heavenly model of what the whole earth might become by man's work (by imitating God's labor). From this center of God's own special work, mankind was to work out the purposes of God in adorning and beautifying the earth and developing its resources. In all his plans and purposes Adam was to imitate the perfect pattern shown him in Eden. Thus the earth would become the garden of the Lord. Among other things, God evidently planned for

man to introduce a greater richness and variety to nature's scenery by planting things in certain spots which did not naturally occur there. What object lesson do you see in this about soul culture?

Adam "was placed, as God's representative, over the lower orders of being. They cannot understand or acknowledge the sovereignty of God, yet they were made capable of loving and serving man. The psalmist says, 'Thou madest him to have dominion over the works of thy hands; thou hast put all things under his feet...the beasts of the field; the fowl of the air,...and whatsoever passeth through the paths of the seas' (Psalm 8:6-8). [Even the animal kingdom would be blessed by man's influence. Could it not be that the habits imparted by Adam to the creatures taken under his care would become second nature to their offspring?]

"Man was to bear God's image, both in outward resemblance and in character. Christ alone is *'the express image'* (Hebrews 1:3) of the Father; but man was formed

in the likeness of God. His nature was in harmony with the will of God. His mind was capable of comprehending divine things. His affections were pure; his appetites and passions were under the control of reason. He was holy and happy in bearing the image of God and in perfect obedience to His will.

"As man came forth from the hand of his Creator, he was of lofty stature and perfect symmetry. His countenance bore the ruddy tint of health and glowed with the light of life and joy. Adam's height was much greater than that of men who now inhabit the earth. Eve was somewhat less in stature; yet her form was noble, and full of beauty. The sinless pair wore no artificial garments; they were clothed with a covering of light and glory, such as the angels wear. So long as they lived in obedience to God, this robe of light continued to enshroud them." (*Patriarchs and Prophets* 45)

The family of needleleaf trees includes members such as firs, hemlocks, pines, redwoods, and spruces. There are about 500 kinds of needleleaf trees. Most of them have narrow, pointed, needle-like leaves. A few types have narrow, scalelike leaves, such as cedars and junipers. In the beginning all trees were evergreen, even the broadleaf trees, but sin changed that.

Most needleleaf trees have a growth pattern with a strong leading shoot. Short side branches grow out of the main shoot. Most firs and spruce trees grow tall and straight. Pine trees branch out and are not pointed at the top. The special shape of each kind of tree makes us think about how people who look alike are often related, or belong to one family.

Most needleleaf trees are evergreen, but they do make new needles each year. As the older needles turn yellow or brown and drop, the younger needles that are growing stay green and do not fall. So this type of tree looks green all year long. This is the reason why many needleleaf trees are called evergreens. There are a few kinds of needleleaf trees that are deciduous, such as the larch and the bald cypress.

Needleleaf trees are called softwoods because most of them have softer wood than broadleaf trees. Some with harder woods are Douglas fir, and yews.

Needleleaf trees belong to a group of plants called gymnosperms. These do not have flowers and their seeds are not enclosed to form fruits. Most gymnosperms bear their seeds in cones. Botanists call such trees conifers, which means "cone bearers."

Most conifers grow north of the equator. They form four families which include the pine, yew, cypress, and taxodium. The pine family has the most members, and includes pines, firs, hemlocks, larches, and spruces. The yew family includes yews and Japanese yews. The cypress family includes cypress, arborvitae, and junipers. While the taxodium family includes bald-cypresses, redwoods and giant sequoias. This last family of very large, stately trees calls to mind how Adam came forth from the hand of his Creator, and he was of lofty stature (height) and perfect symmetry. Eve was like the other conifers, she was somewhat less in statue. Man's form, his physical structure, his mental moral qualities, his instincts and habits, are all symbolized in the forms and structures and habits of the trees around him. Think about each of these parallels and see what you can discern with the Great Interpreter's help. "I will meditate also of all thy work, and talk of thy doings" (Psalm 77:12).

Tending the trees of Eden, Adam and Eve would have to study them closely, to notice their special characteristics, to watch the way they grew and to adapt their treatment to their different requirements. In this way Adam and Eve would come to understand the secret spiritual truths which the different trees taught. God talked to man not only among the trees of the garden but also, in a sense, through them.

Remind

- 7. When you go shopping for produce and notice the extra large apples think of how Adam was to care for and develop the fruit trees of Eden.



Eve's creation was a physical prophecy of the Bride of Christ coming forth from the Second Adam in the sleep of His death. Christ's side was pierced during His death-sleep.

took one of his ribs, and closed up the flesh instead there of; And the rib, which the Lord God had taken from man, made he a woman, and brought her unto the man. And Adam said, This is now bone of my bones, and flesh of my flesh: she shall be called Woman, because she was taken out of man. Therefore shall a man leave his father and his mother, and shall cleave unto his wife: and they shall be one flesh" (Genesis 2:21-24).

"God Himself gave Adam a companion. He provided 'an help meet for him'—a helper corresponding to him—one who was fitted to be his companion, and who could be one with him in love and sympathy. Eve was created from a rib taken from the side of Adam, signifying that she was not to control him as the head, nor to be trampled under his feet as an inferior, but to stand by his side as an equal, to be loved and protected by him. A part of man, bone of his bone, and flesh of his flesh, she was his second self, showing the close union and the affectionate attachment that should exist in this relation.

"God celebrated the first marriage. Thus the institution has for its originator the Creator of the universe. 'Marriage is honorable' (Hebrews 13:4); it was one of the first gifts of God to man, and it is one of the two institutions that, after the Fall, Adam brought with him beyond the gates of Paradise. When the divine principles are recognized and obeyed in this relation, marriage is a blessing; it guards the purity and happiness of the race, it provides for man's social needs, it elevates the physical, the intellectual, and the moral nature.

"'And the Lord God planted a garden eastward in Eden; and there he put the man whom he had formed.' Everything that God had made was the perfection of beauty, and nothing seemed wanting that could contribute to the happiness of the holy pair; yet the Creator gave them still another token of His love, by preparing a garden especially for their home. In this garden were trees of every variety, many of them laden with fragrant and delicious fruit. There were lovely vines growing upright, yet presenting a most graceful appearance, with their branches drooping

under their load of tempting fruit of the richest and most varied hues. It was the work of Adam and Eve to train the branches of the <u>vine</u> to form bowers, thus making for themselves a dwelling from living trees covered with foliage and fruit. There were fragrant flowers of every hue in rich profusion. In the midst of the garden stood the tree of life, surpassing in glory all other trees. Its fruit appeared like apples of gold and silver, and had the power to perpetuate life.

"The creation was now complete." The heavens and the earth were finished, and all the host of them." And God saw everything that he had made, and, behold, it was very good." Eden bloomed on earth. Adam and Eve had free access to the tree of life. No taint of sin or shadow of death marred the fair creation. "The morning stars sang together and all the sons of God shouted for joy" (Job 38:7)." (Patriarchs and Prophets 46-47)

Nature Palm, Pandanus, and Lily trees

What is a monocotyledon? It is the name of the tree family that palms, pandanus, and lily trees belong to. These trees live mainly in warm climates. Of the three kinds of trees in this group we will learn more about the palm. As trees have families so God established a family of people. The first family included Adam, Eve and any children they later had. "It was under the trees of Eden that the first dwellers on earth had chosen their sanctuary. There Christ had communed with the father of mankind. When banished from Paradise, our first parents still worshiped in fields and groves, and there Christ met them with the gospel of His grace...It was at Christ's direction that for fifteen centuries the Hebrew people had left their homes for one week every year, and had dwelt in booths formed from the green branches 'goodly trees, branches of palm trees, and boughs of thick trees, and willows of the brook' (Leviticus 23:40)." (The Desire of Ages 290-291) This time of

"Thy wife shall be as a fruitful vine by the sides of thine house: thy children like olive plants [trees] round about thy table" (Psalm 128:3). Adam and Eve's "house" was a living parable signi-


fying that it is people that make up a home. The family is the garden of the Lord.

dwelling in booths made of palm branches, in part, **helped** the people to be reminded of the Eden life God's people would enjoy in the future.

There are about 2,500 kinds of palm trees. There are coconut palms, date palms, and decorative palms. Most palm trees have no branches but the trunk is crowned by enormous leaves. The leaves are either feather-shaped or fan-shaped. Palm trees are used in the Scriptures as a symbol of the righteous. "The righteous shall flourish like the palm tree" (Psalm 92:12).

Pandanus and lily trees have branches. Each branch has a crown of sword-shaped leaves.

Most pandanus trees have tall, stilt-like roots that extend into the ground from high on the trunk or branches. Lily trees are closely related to the garden flowers called lilies. Many of these trees have attractive, fragrant flowers. (The family unit is to be as attractive and fragrant as the lily tree, each member giving off a sweet scent of **helpfulness** to the rest of the family.) The yucca trees of Mexico and the far Southern United States are lily trees.

"No, thank you. I only did as I would be done by. If my little sister was lame and in the street, I should want some one to help her across."


"But cannot I do something for you, my boy?" said the lady.



the test, his instruction to this children would have been only of loyalty. His mind and thoughts would have been as the mind and thoughts of God. He would have been taught by God as His husbandry and building. His character would have been moulded in accordance with the character of God." (1 Bible Commentary 1082)

Symbolism in Genesis:

Eve was created in a different way than Adam. One parallel we can draw from Eve being taken out of Adam's side is that the first child in the family has a molding effect on subsequent children. Be especially careful, parents, in the formation of that first child's character because the other children will be shaped by their example more or less.

Also, the fact that Eve was taken out of the side of Adam while he was in a deep sleep was a physical prophecy of the bride of Christ, the church, coming forth out of the side of the Second Adam in the sleep of His death. (His side was pierced.) We, as His bride, are to be His help-meet, aiding Him in His work on the earth even as Eve assisted Adam.

He who said to Adam, "It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make him an help meet for him," must Himself have had the same feeling. God desired, so to speak, to find an helpmeet for Himself—to surround Himself with intelligent and moral beings who could in some measure understand His thoughts and sympathize with His ends, who would obey Him not because they had to, but from the spontaneous affection of their hearts.

Research Multiply and Subdue the Earth

"And God blessed them, and God said unto them, Be fruitful, and multiply, and replenish the earth, and subdue it: and have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the fowl of the air, and over every living thing that moveth upon the earth" (Genesis 1:28).

God blessed Adam and Eve. This blessing was not said about them, as the animals, but expressed "unto them." This is the first revelation of God to man. This blessing to populate the earth has been realized today as it was before the Flood.

Man was to "subdue" the earth and that means that it was man's duty and destiny to rule over the earthly creation.

It is God's blessing that enables mankind to multiply. "The raising of a dead body to life would astonish us, but we are unaffected that



From Him all life proceeds. To Him all service, homage, and allegiance belong. For all created beings there is the one great principle of life—dependence upon and cooperation with God. The relationship existing in the pure family of God in heaven was to exist in the family of God on earth. Under God, Adam was to stand at the head of the earthly family to maintain the principles of the heavenly family. This would have brought peace and happiness. But the law that none 'liveth to himself' Satan was determined to oppose. He desired to live for self. He sought to make himself a center of influence. It was this that incited rebellion in heaven, and it was man's acceptance of this principle that brought sin on earth. When Adam sinned, man broke away from the heaven-ordained center. Nature Cycad Trees and Tree Ferns

Cycad trees look a lot like palm trees. They have a trunk without branches and a crown of long, feathery leaves. Cycads are more closely related to pine trees than to palm trees. Cycads produce seeds in cones that look like large pine cones. These trees use to grow all over the earth in the beginning. Since the flood they mainly grow in warm, moist places of Africa, Asia, and South America.

Ferns are best known as short plants with feathery, green fronds (leaves). In the tropics and some places with mild climates, many relatives of these plants are trees. Eden had a mild climate and cycad trees and tree ferns could have easily thrived there. Tree ferns look a lot like palm trees, but they belong to another family of plants. Tree ferns do not have flowers or cones and so do not make seeds. They reproduce by tiny spores, which develop on the underside of their fronds. Adam and Eve were to populate the earth with people as the trees were to bring forth their kind.

Also, as part of their work in subduing the earth, Adam and Eve were given "the task of caring for the fruit trees and cultivating and training vegetation. Useful labor was to be their safeguard, and it was to be perpetuated through all generations to the close of earth's history." (*Child Guidance* 345) "The book of nature, which spread its living lessons before them, afforded an exhaustless source of instruction and delight. On every <u>leaf</u> of the forest...God's name was written." (*Education* 21)





Research Formation of Food for Man

"And God said, Behold, I have given you every herb bearing seed, which is upon the face of the earth, and every tree, in the which is the fruit of a tree yielding seed; to you it shall be for meat.

"And to every beast of the earth, and to every fowl of the air, and to every thing that creepeth upon the earth, wherein there is life, I have given every green herb for meat: and it was so. [No beast was originally designed to prey on others.]

"And God saw every thing that he had made, and, behold, it was very good. And the evening and the morning were the sixth day" (Genesis 1:29-31).

"In order to know what are the best foods, we must study God's original plan for man's diet. He who created man and who understands his needs appointed Adam his food. 'Behold,' He said, 'I have given you every herb yielding seed,...and every tree, in which is the fruit of a tree yielding seed; to you it shall be for food' (Genesis 1:29, A.R.V.). Upon leaving Eden to gain his livelihood by tilling the earth under the curse of sin, man received permission to eat also 'the herb of the field' (Genesis 3:18).

"Grains, fruits, nuts, and vegetables constitute the diet chosen for us by our Creator. These foods, prepared in as simple and natural a manner as possible, are the most healthful and nourishing. They impart a strength, a power of endurance, and a vigor of intellect that are not afforded by a more complex and stimulating diet.

"But not all foods wholesome in themselves are equally suited to our needs under all circumstances. Care should be taken in the selection of food. Our diet should be suited to the season, to the climate in which we live, and to the occupation we follow. Some foods that are adapted for use at one season or in one climate are not suited to another. So there are different foods best suited for persons in different occupations. Often food that



Nature Ginkgo Trees

The ginkgo tree is a gymnosperm like the needleleaf trees. But unlike other gymnosperm trees the ginkgo has fanshaped leaves. These leaves look like the fronds of a fern. These trees are native to Asia. It is believed that the garden of Eden was in what is now Asia.

Some trees we no longer have were destroyed during the flood. These trees are called fossil trees. Two of these extinct trees are the club moss tree and horsetail tree. The club mosses and the horsetails living today are herbs.

One tree that was removed from the earth before the Flood was the tree of life. It had the perfect food for man upon it. "He who fitted the tree to bear its burden of goodly fruit has made man capable of hearing the precious fruits of righteousness. He has planted man in His garden and tenderly cared for him, and He expects him to bear fruit...How anxiously we watch a favorite tree or plant, expecting it to reward our care by producing buds, blossoms, and fruit; and how disappointed we are to find nothing but leaves. With how much more anxiety and tender interest does the heavenly Father watch the spiritual growth of those whom He has made in His own image and for whom He condescended to give His Son that they might be elevated, ennobled, and glorified." (5 Testimonies 250-251)



"There are many more simple remedies which will do much to restore healthful action to the body. All these simple preparations the Lord expects us to use for ourselves, but man's extremities are God's opportunities. If we neglect to do that which is within the reach of nearly every family, and ask the Lord to relieve pain when we are too indolent to make use of these remedies within our power, it is simply presumption. The Lord expects us to work in order that we may obtain food. He does not propose that we shall gather the harvest unless we break the sod, till the soil, and cultivate the produce. Then God sends the rain and the sunshine and the clouds to cause vegetation to flourish. God works and man cooperates with God. Then there is seed time and harvest.






- Learn shapes
- Some are very easy to recognize by their fruits, berries, and leaves.
- Go for a walk and see how many trees you can name.
- As a family, go to a botanical garden where the names of the trees are listed. You can look at the labels and write down the names, and also collect leaves and seed pods on the ground from them.
- Just as you can recognize a tree by its leaves and fruit or flowers, you can also learn to tell a tree by the way it branches.
- If you look at a tree that has lost its leaves, it is easy to see the pattern its branches make.
- If you live in a climate where deciduous trees grow, you can soon learn to recognize the different kinds by the way they branch.

- Choose six very different trees near your home and draw them, showing their branching pattern.
- Make a paper model of trees that branch the same way. Fold two sheets of thick paper (or card) in half, one inside the other. Then lightly draw branches on them. Now cut out the tree. Open out the folds and slot the tree together.



Another way to make a symmetrical tree is to put ink on one half of the paper, then while it is wet, fold over and press.



Which broadleaf tree in the United States has the longest fruit? the longest leaf?

It is the same tree—Hardy Catalpa. It grows in the middle Mississippi Valley, but may be growing in the nearby city as an ornamental tree along the street or in a park.

Its seed pods are long, slim, and black. They grow about 8 to 20 inches (200 to 500 millimeters) long. They look like big, black string beans.


